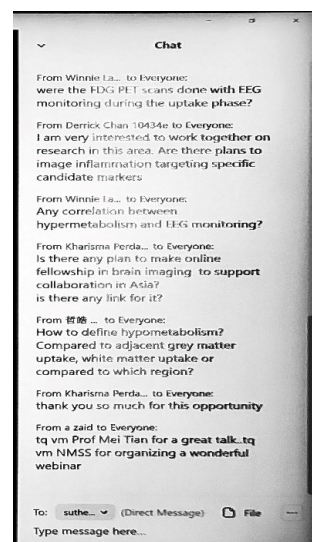
NMS(S) 2020 AGM Special Webinar by Professor Tian Mei Received Enthusiastic Response
